Welcome to the July meeting report. This month we have a meeting of two parts. Originally, we were due to have our usual Summer Styling workshop. However, we were recently contacted by the husband of a keen bonsai grower asking if we could help him find good homes for his wife's collection. Unfortunately, due to ill health, she could no longer look after her trees and after 45 years of cultivation he felt that they should go to people who would give them the care and attention that they deserved. We agreed to collect the trees, a big thank you to Paul and Cathy for doing that, and then auction them off with the money going to a suitable charity. Unfortunately, this is something that we "collectors" all have to face at some time or other. Unless we have a family member or friend who shares our particular obsession and is happy to take over from us then all our "preciouses" may end up being given away or even worse, sold for the amount that we said we bought them for! So, the moral of the story is; decide what you are going to do with them before it is too late. So, the first part of our meeting was taken up with a "mini auction" made up of the 10 trees from her collection plus various pots and some extra trees from Ade's garden. After vigorous bidding all of the lots were sold and the new owners settled down to work on their new acquisitions. After a brief bidding war with Ade, I managed to secure an ancient looking Larch that had been in her collection for 45 years, this now means that my collection consists of 50% Larches and I will not be buying any more, unless I find a really good one, that is! Unfortunately, all of the trees will need some gentle rehabilitation. My Larch is very "leggy" and has lost a lot of branches but these will make great jins and eventually it will make a very nice "Heritage" bonsai. For now, it is having a rest after being "slip potted into a larger pot with freer draining growing medium, some light feed and daily misting to help it recover. Once it starts pushing out shoots, I will reduce the length of the branches and hopefully do some wiring in the winter.



Right, let's have a look at what everyone is doing. Pam "A.K.A my apprentice" had brought along a couple of trees to work on. Her Spindle tree, bought at our club auction back in Feb, which is happily throwing out shoots and was in need of a quick trim and a couple of collected Larches. Yes, I know more Larches but these will be styled as Literati, ready for the Chairman's challenge next year. I brought along my Tamarisk which has responded well to repotting and regular feeds by throwing out lots of new branches and they all need wiring down to maintain the weeping style.



Simon had brought long a large Boulevard Cyprus which was in need of some help. These were very popular trees for bonsai, back in the day but they do suffer from die back and can end up with very long branches and lots of brown foliage. Much like Simon's tree. So what to do? Luckily Bob was on hand to advise and they were soon removing all the dead foliage and cutting back the tips of the branches.

Once the branches were cleaned up we could see some new buds on the trunk and at the branch junctions so hopefully Simon will be able to develop these into new foliage pads. For an example of what you can do with these trees Google "Boulevard Cyprus bonsai" and you might be surprised!
